



# Indescribable Iceland

A journey to explore something unique!

The tour "Along the Ring Road at a Relaxed Pace" takes you to all the highlights you can experience along the coast of Iceland, such as geysers, glaciers and waterfalls, lava landscapes, and the fjords of East-Iceland as well as the Snæfellsnes peninsula with the majestic Snæfellsjökull Glacier.





### Travel Season: May-July

### **Highlights**

National parks Þingvellir and Vatnajökulsþjóðgarður with Skaftafell, Geysers, Waterfalls Gullfoss, Seljalandsfoss, Skógafoss, Dettifoss and Goðafoss, The Glacial Lagoon Jökulsárlón, Riding, whale watching- and river-rafting-options. Snæfellsnes peninsula and Snæfellsjökull Glacier.



## The Odyssey

Day 1: Arrival Upon arrival at Keflavík International Airport, you pick up your prebooked rental car. If you arrive in the morning or afternoon, you might want to stop by at the Blue Lagoon on your way into the city of Reykjavík. If arriving late, you will find your accommodation near the airport.

Day 2: National Park Þingvellir, Geysers & Gullfoss Waterfall



Leave the city in the morning for the UNESCO World Heritage Site and national park Þingvellir. Here you should take a walk through the Almannagjá rift and visit the site of the old parliament. From here your journey takes you through the village of Laugarvatn to the geysers, where you can see the very active hot spring Strokkur erupt spectacularly every five minutes or so. From Geysir it's only a 10-minute drive to the impressive waterfall, Gullfoss. A drive towards the south coast will take you to your

accommodation. In the summer time you might have the opportunity to attend a classical concert in Skálholt cathedral.

Day 3: Þjórsárdalur Valley & Hekla Volcano Follow the glacial river Þjórsá to the Þjórsárdalur valley, where you come across the beautiful waterfall Hjálparfoss. You might also want to stop at Stöng, an excavated farm that was buried under ash during a volcanic eruption in Mt. Hekla in the year 1104, before you visit the reconstruction of the farm, Þjóðveldisbær, located close to Stöng. Then drive along the foot of Mt.



Hekla through a desert-like landscape of pumice to your accommodation near the south coast.



Day 4: Waterfalls, Activities on a Glacier & the Black South Coast Only a short drive away from the village of Hvolsvöllur you come across the waterfall Seljalandsfoss; a walk behind the waterfall is an unforgettable experience! Driving eastward you reach Skógar, where the beautiful waterfall Skógafoss awaits you. There we also recommend a visit to the local folk- and transport museum and if you are up for an easy hike, you can follow the river Skógá for a while and see further waterfalls as well as the notorious glacial volcano Eyjafjallajökull. The local Folk- and transport museum in Skógar is also well worth a visit. If you are in search of an adventure, you

might find it on the glacier Sólheimajökull, where you participate in hiking and snow scooter tours on the glacier. Detours to the bird cliffs of Dyrhólaey and the black sandy beach of Reynisfjara are well worth it, before heading to the village of Vík. With Vík behind you, an interesting option is to turn left towards the mountains and into the Þakgil canyon, a place surrounded by impressive mountain landscapes in the shadow of the glacier Mýrdalsjökull. Afterwards

you follow the ring road further through the desert-like black sand landscapes of Mýrdalssandur and the lava field Eldhraun to the village Kirkjubæjarklaustur.

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Day 5: Skaftafell, Svartifoss Waterfall & the Glacier Lagoon Head to Skaftafell, located within Europe's largest national park Vatnajökulsþjóðgarður, where you will find hiking options of varied length and difficulty: From an easy walk to the glacier Skaftafellsjökull or a short hike to the Svartifoss waterfall to the more challenging routes to Sjónarnípa, Kristínartindar or Bæjarstaðaskógur. In the afternoon, drive eastward along the edge of the Vatnajökull glacier until you reach the glacial lagoon Jökulsárlón. Take a walk along the shore of the lagoon or go on a boat trip amidst the drifting icebergs. You have a good chance of spotting seals here.



Day 6: Fjord Landscapes of the East
In the fishing village Höfn you will find an
exhibition dedicated to the Vatnajökull
glacier, worth visiting before you leave.
East of the village you reach a tunnel that
leads you to the fjord landscapes of East
Iceland characterized by dramatic
precipices and narrow coastlines.
Along the way you will have several
opportunities for taking walks and hikes

along the coast that are ideal for bird watching. A special walking route for bird watchers has been marked on the outskirts of the fishing village Djúpivogur in the Búlandsnes area – an absolute must for bird watchers! In Breiðdalsvík village you can visit the local Geo-Centre and in Stöðvarfjörður village you should pay a visit to the private mineral collection of Mrs Petra Sveinsdóttir, one of the largest in the world. A tunnel brings you from

Fáskrúðsfjörður to Reyðarfjörður and onwards to Egilsstaðir. If you would rather have more time to explore the area around Egilsstaðir (tips upon request), you can take the shorter route along the ring road through Breiðdalur valley.





Day 7: Fjords, Waterfalls, the Monster in the Lake or Riding Tours

Spend the day in the area around Egilsstaðir. You can drive to one of the fjords, e.g. to the puffin colony in Bakkagerði fishing village, in Fjord Borgarfjörður eystri. You can also book a guided hike from here into the lovely hiking area Víknaslóðir, further details on request. The fjords Seyðisfjörður, Mjóifjörður or the drive to Reyðarfjörður and further to Eskifjörður and Norðfjörður may also be interesting to visit. The second option for the day would be a drive around the lake Lögurinn, alleged abode of the sea monster Lagarfljótsormurinn lives, apparently a relative of the Loch

Ness monster. Your drive will lead you through the largest forest in Iceland,

Hallormsstaðarskógur. You will see highest waterfall, Hengifoss (118 m/387ft), and the somewhat smaller waterfall Litlanesfoss in the same river. The waterfalls can be reached by foot. Afterwards you can pay a visit to the farm Skriðuklaustur, built by the author Gunnar Gunnarsson, where you will find a nice little restaurant. A monetary of the Augustinian order was founded there in 1493 and recent

archaeological findings are now on display near the farm

house. If interested in getting acquainted with the Icelandic horse you can either go on a riding tour starting from a horse farm near Egilsstaðir. The ride takes you along



lakes and through meadows. The other riding tour starts from the quite remote farm Húsey, where you go seal spotting by horse. Information about the riding tours as well as further tips for the day available on request.

Day 8: Traditional Farm, Dettifoss Waterfall & Hot Mud Springs Depart from Egilsstaðir through the Jökuldalur Valley and further through the desertlike lava landscapes towards your destination.

We recommend a detour through the valley of Möðrudalur to the old farm Sænautasel, where you can enjoy a cup of coffe at a small café in an original turf house. After crossing the bridge over the glacial river Jökulsá á Fjöllum, another detour that should not be missed leads to the tremendous Dettifoss waterfall.

Afterwards you cannot miss the foul smelling hot springs in Námaskarð, and if you want to take a peak into the underworld, you will find the crater Víti (the name literally means hell!) in the nearby volcanic area of Krafla.

Day 9: Whale Watching, Ásbyrgi Canyon & Dettifoss Waterfall You might want to start your day by visiting the fishing village of Húsavík, where whale watching boat tours depart

from the harbour several times a day in the high season. Drive further around the Tjörnes peninsula to the national park Jökulsárgljúfur, a part of Vatnajökulsþjóðgarður, to see further sights such as the Ásbyrgi canyon,

Hljóðaklettar (literally "Echo cliffs") and the waterfall Dettifoss from the east bank of the river.

Day 10: Lake Mývatn

Spend the day around Lake Mývatn, where a variety of sights and activities is on offer. You can take a walk through the Dimmuborgir

lava field, see the pseudo craters of Skútustaðir and scale the crater Hverfjall. The Nature Baths are perfect for some relaxation, and the privately-owned and slightly quaint bird museum on the lake side can also be recommended. On the way to Akureyri you must not miss the impressive

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waterfall Goðafoss. If you are interested, you can take a day for a tour of the volcano Askja

in the highlands, north of Vatnajökull glacier (the programme for days 8-10 would have to be changed

accordingly).

Day 11: Akureyri & Warm Natural Pool in Skagafjörður After a tour of Akureyri you leave for the Skagafjörður area, where you can take a river-rafting tour or go riding. The local folk museum in Glaumbær as well as the turf house church in Víðimýri are well worth visiting. From Reykir, north of the village Sauðárkrókur, you can join an adventure tour by boat to the island of Drangey. Directly on the coast you will also find the inviting warm natural pool Grettislaug. Drive further along the north coast of Iceland via the village Blönduós, where you might want to stop to look at the Icelandic Textile Museum, and onwards to the area of Miðfjörður.



Day 12: Seal Watching on Vatnsnes
Peninsula & Snæfellsnes
On the Vatnsnes peninsula, you are
in a good location for spotting seals.
Afterwards, pay a visit to the Seal
Centre in Hvammstangi, where
you can find out everything
about Icelandic seals. Drive to the
fjord Hrútafjörður and after
passing the tiny village Borðeyri,
you turn left to the plateau
Laxárdalsheiði towards Snæfellsnes

peninsula. From mid-May to mid-September boat tours to the Breiðafjörður bay are on offer, leaving from the harbour in Stykkishólmur. On those tours you experience the area's abundant bird life (high season mid-May to mid-August) and can taste seafood caught just for you.

Day 13: Shark Museum & Glacier Snæfellsjökull

At the farm of Bjarnarhöfn, just outside Stykkishólmur, a privately-owned museum dedicated to shark catching in Iceland is well worth the visit. From the harbour in the fishing village of Grundarfjörður you can go on a boat tour

during which you can try sea angling, spot puffins (May to mid-August) and, if you are lucky, see whales.

Afterwards you drive on around the glacier Snæfellsjökull towards the south coast of the peninsula. On your way, you should check out sights such as Dritvík and the coast of Djúpalónssandur, the bird cliffs of Lóndrangar and the small fishing villages of Hellnar and Arnarstapi. Your accommodation is located on the south coast.

Day 14: South Coast of Snæfellsnes Peninsula & Reykjavík

By the farm Ytri-

Tunga, you will almost certainly spot seals resting on the rocky coast. The basalt columns in Gerðuberg are also wor th a stop.

We also recommend a visit to the Settlement Centre in Borgarnes before heading back to the capital. In Reykjavík you should make sure to take time for a walk through town, to the old harbour as well as to Reykjavík's most splendid church, Hallgrímskirkja. The glass dome of Perlan (the Pearl), situated up

on the hill Öskjuhlíð near the city centre, provides a magnificent panoramic view of the city.

#### Day 15: Departure

The time of departure determines your plan for the day. If you leave in the late afternoon or the evening you will have time to further explore Reykjavík and stop by at the Blue Lagoon on your way to the airport.

If your flight leaves in the early morning you'll have to leave Reykjavík early for the airport, where you return your rental car before departure.



### Journey Inclusions

• 14 nights incl. breakfast in pre-booked accommodations, 5 double rooms with private facilities. General information about the accommodation:



- -Many of the accommodations do offer their guests access to open-air jacuzzis.
- -Higher accommodation classes are not available in large parts of Iceland. However if higher class hotels are in place and available, these can be offered with surcharge.
- -Availability can only be checked with a more precise travel date.
- 14 days rental car of your choice 3 x N Category (Skoda Octavia Combi or similar).
- Unlimited driving, CDW and two drivers for each car.
- Pick-up/drop-off at the International Airport in Keflavík.
- Iceland Road Guide.
- Road Map 1:500 000.
- Detailed and personalised route description.
- Service telephone number while traveling in *Iceland*.
- VAT and lodging tax.

### Journey Exclusions

- *International flights or ferry, fuel, extra driver* (€ 29 per driver/rental),
- meals besides breakfast, SCDW (add  $14 \times 14$ ), road toll (Hvalfjörður Tunnel), entrance fees and activities.
- Rooms with private facilities are booked in middle class hotels, country hotels, higher class guesthouses or farm-guesthouses.
